#### From the Editor

I went to Limon November 23 to take some more Big Boy photos. I mainly wanted to see the tour of the UP Hugo Round House. I was there in 2001 and took photos. The Limon Museum had planned dinner with a meet-and-greet with the Big Boy crew; however, it was cancelled a few days before the event.

The photos I took in Harriman, Wyoming, showed a beautiful, restored, like-new engine. The photo my wife took in Limon shows a dirty grimy workhorse. The trip through the Midwest was not kind to its appearance.

Monday, the Big Boy headed out to Denver. One last chance for some videos. At 20 degrees outside with a big steam engine starting out at that temperature, this was not to be missed. I picked my spot early where I wanted to be and waited 35 minutes. The wait was worth it.

I went to Hugo Sunday for the tour of the UP Round House as it is undergoing restoration. There are several photographs under the Trackside column, including before and after.

The following comments are from Christopher Fox.

"The doors for bays 3-5 will be completed and



installed next summer as well as the window panels above the doors. Then the historic outer structure will be historically correct and complete. The interior will be next. We are planning bays 1-4 as an event center, bay 5 as kitchen & restrooms, bay 6 as conference rooms, bay 7 as a museum, and bay 8 to be restored as an engine service bay complete with an engine."

#### **Tool Time**

#### **Chain Link Fence Tools - Stu Jones**

Stu presented a couple of tools for making chain link fence. First acquire some bridal vail from a fabric store. Krylon clear spray is used to give the material some body then spray paint with a grey paint. Next, mark off a scale six-foot line (scale) on cardboard, place the chain link material on the cardboard. Place on a paper cutter and slice along the line and you will have a

six-foot fence material. For the fence posts Stu uses K and S brass rod. Use .032 for HO scale and .020 for N scale. Stu had a couple of photos showing how a long stretch of fence looks.

#### Save the Louisville 104-Year-Old Caboose



I came across this effort by a local Louisville resident. Is it really a caboose or a boxcar conversion? Read on. I have not seen one like it.

The following excerpt is from the Mid-Continent Railway Museum. "From 1938 until 1944, the Rock Island's 124th Street (Chicago) shops rebuilt 200 40-ton single-sheathed outside-braced wooden boxcars into cabooses for use across their system."

The following excerpt is from the Oklahoma Railway Museum. "The caboose was originally built as a 40-ton Class B-2 boxcar, probably by the Bettendorf Company of Iowa in 1915, for the CRI&P Railroad."

Adam Crews -- Item is a PRR lantern from his uncle.






Dennis Hagen -- Items are 3 railroad manuals from 1896-1907

## From the Library

This month's selection is **Denver's Street Railways**, Volume 3 - The Interurbans.

You may have an interest in Denver area history, especially as it relates to transportation. Or maybe your interest is Denver history in general. This book is a must have. And, of course, your interest could be focused specifically on Interurbans. Same consideration, a must-have book.

The book contains many pictures, most in black and white, some in color. There are schedules, maps and documents to provide a very complete picture of this era in time.

On page 262, there is even a picture of members of the NMRA in Denver at the national convention on an excursion riding an interurban. They are observing the passage of the California Zephyr led by a new Alco PA at Clear Creek Junction, probably around 1949.

Published in 2010, there are 373 pages of fascinating transportation history.

## Top row: new roof and restored engine doors

Middle row: view of the interior and floor. The floor is made from cut ties buried vertically.

Bottom row: new roof at the front of the round house and a model of the round house. The model of the round house has the track on the wrong side so I reversed the photograph.

Note that the roof is not plywood. Every repair is historically accurate to the day it was built.
