Challenger 3985

From the Union Pacific Steam Club

Since work was completed on No. 4014, people have asked about the fate of The Challenger No. 3985.

The short answer: There are no plans to restore No. 3985. Many years of hard operation have resulted in the locomotive requiring a complete frame-up restoration similar to what was needed to make No. 4014 operational. Historically, Union Pacific's steam program has had two steam locomotives on its roster, and that count will remain the same moving forward.

No. 3985 last operated in "regular" train service in 1957. It was retired in 1962 and stored in the roundhouse in Cheyenne, Wyoming, until 1975 when it was placed on display near the Cheyenne depot. A group of Union Pacific employees volunteered their services to restore the locomotive to running condition in 1981.

Where No. 3985 will ultimately reside is still in question, but it's safe to say the locomotive will remain officially retired from service.



Tool Time

Wire Straightening Tool

Larry Stephens showed the tools he used to straighten wire. The first wire he demonstrated on was taken from the shield wiring of a TV coax cable. It is wire size 38 (004 inch). The wire pulled from the shield cluster has many kinks. To remove these kinks, secure one end of a wire to a popsicle stick with a mini vise grip and gently pull on the wire with a small plier. Using the board as a fulcrum gently pull on the wire until you feel it stretch.

The second wire pulled (below) is size 14 (.062 inch), and a 1 by 2 board is used. This wire came from a spool. Again, the same technique is used, but using a larger vise grip and larger plyers. Note the metal plate between the wire and board as the board is too soft to hold wire. See insert in center of photo below.

I'm Not Cheap, I'm Frugal

I've been using Gorilla Glue for a long

time and felt the two sizes are poorly marketed: the .74 oz. (\$6) size is too large and the .21 oz. (\$4) size is too small. Has anyone used the large bottle up before it went too thick to use?



I came across this at Hobby Lobby. A

much better size and priced product. The .5 oz. (\$2.99) and the 1 oz. (\$4.99). It comes in three thicknesses. Thin, medium and thick.



I bought some thin and tested it against the Gorilla glue. I quickly found the two products are not interchangeable. They each have their purpose. The Gorilla being thick worked better on large surfaces and had a slower drying time. The thin can wick in very small openings and had a fast drying time. It can also flow where you don't want it. I can tell you "firsthand" that the thin does work well and quick, AND it does wear off the fingers in a few days.

Part two - Logging Video

Dick Hunter showed a video that he edited from one he recorded in the 1980s during an NMRA Oregon convention tour. It started off showing the world's largest love seat that was made from a $20^{\prime\prime}$ x $30^{\prime\prime}$ x $110^{\prime\prime}$ long log. The rest of the video showed a logging operation, loading of the logs on to trucks to the unloading at the saw mill. It included the mill in operation from logs entering the mill to the final dimensional lumber. The mill is still in operation and they still give tours.

Railroad Special Fonts

Do you need to put **Rio Grande OR** subtraction a rail car, building or a sign? I found this web site that has many railroad specific fonts for free. Mostly logos, signs and some special lettering.

For the Rio Grande, I created this logo from their font file. To create a color image from their fonts requires a graphic program that can overlay the fonts on



each other. I used Power Point. This logo is an orange circle and an orange bar for the background. The black, blue and white are created by three fonts overlaid on each other. As with most fonts, the size can be N scale to Garden scale.
