building, and detailing a layout, all grouped under the label "Back to the Basement." You will not need a DeLorean to take advantage of these trips, but you will be inspired.



Stu Jones's offerings included this Varney F3A and four revenue cars, all HO-scale from the early 1950's. He obtained and built the F3A in November 1952, and it features the fourth Boreas paint scheme. The stamped metal Varney reefer dates from 1950. The green boxcar is from Athearn and was made in 1952. The stock car, an MDC product, is from 1952 and has cast metal sides. The ends were originally cast metal but have been replaced due to normal wear & tear. The last is a Varney product, built in 1950.









The original bill of sale from All-Nation Hobby Shop, located in Chicago, lists the price of this Varney Berkshire 2-8-4 kit at \$39.50. Of course, that was August 12, 1950. Paul Smith brought in this kit, complete with it's own tool box. He also figured out that \$39.50 in today's dollars would be about \$364.00. That's still a bargain for an HOscale brass locomotive model of this quality.




Gary Myers-Division Superintendent

Sunrise Swap

odel railroaders, such as you, tend to collect stuff—lots of stuff, and some of that stuff is just taking up space. It will never be used on their layout, but it is too good to throw out. After all, the modeler might use it some day, even though in his heart he knows he never will. Starting in January, your Division is coming to the rescue with the Sunrise Swap, a six-month trial program.

Bring to each meeting a few of your unwanted or unneeded items to donate, putting them on the designated table. Please bring items that are worth at least a dollar and limit the number of donations. You do not want to overwhelm the membership.

Then, when you get a chance, take a look at the goodies other folks brought. You may find something you cannot live without. After you have made your selection, make your voluntary and appropriate contribution. A dollar is the suggested minimum. If a donation is of significant value, we may want to save it for a silent auction with proceeds shared with the owner.

Not only will you be able to clear out some space in your layout room, you will also be helping your Division. Initially, all proceeds will be earmarked for the sectional layout. Current funding for the sectional project will cover initial base construction, trailer modification (to haul the modules around), and most track work. The additional funds generated by the Sunrise Swap will help pay for additional track work, scenery, buildings, and lighting.

At the end of the meeting, pick up anything that you brought that has not been selected by another member. We do not have any way to transport or store the leftovers. You can always bring it back later to see if the fellow that has been looking for your widget just happened to miss that meeting.

From their presentation you will learn the fine points of what judges are looking for when they judge a model in an NMRA contest.

♦ In order to create the most secure environment possible for its youth members, the Boy Scouts of America (BSA) has developed numerous procedural and leadership selection policies for its adult leaders. Effective June 1, 2010, those policies included Youth Protection Training. After that date, no adult may register with the BSA as an adult leader in any capacity without first completing this training. The training is good for two years and can be accomplished online. The training can be found at www.scouting. org. Across the top of the page find and click My Scouting. You will be required to create an account which will then allow you access to the training.

Upon completion of the training, you will be able to print a certificate of completion which should be included with your next Adult Leader Application. The whole process should take less than an hour. If you have any questions, contact John Stevens at scouts@hq.nmra.org.

♦ The folks at x2011, the Sacramento 2011 Convention, report that they've now implemented RSS feeds from their web site. Attendees and potential attendees can simply subscribe to the RSS feed and they'll receive e-mail messages when items are added or changed on the web site. ♦ Incidentally, the x2011 online registration system is up and running. 
