

# Suggested Chase Kit

- Scanner – To listen in on the action.
- Camera – Well, you could go to just watch!
- Binocular – In case you can't get close enough to the signal.
- Lawn chair – To chase away other railfans with or sit in.
- Step stool – To get different shooting angles and perspective.
- Food & water – Some places are nowhere close to getting rations.
- Extra clothing – It can get pretty cold in the mornings and evenings.
- Jacket & blankets – The mountains are no place to get cold in!
- Cellphone – Verizon will work along the entire length of this tour.
- Reading material – Some trains are separated by hours.
- Timetables – They're almost useless but it never helps.
- Railroad atlas – To know where the trains are when they call.
- General maps – So you don't get lost, and can chase somewhere else.
- Fire extinguisher – Just in case the unthinkable happens.
- Snake repellent – There be some big snakes up in dem hills!
- Bug repellent – The nats can drive one mad in the summer months.
- A Buddy – Cause hobos or escaped cons make for poor conversation.

The actual reception range will vary depending on scanner-antenna combination used. The terrain too will affect the range as well. Expect better reception on the eastern leg of the tour where the hills and mountains are lesser.
