IN THIS FALL ISSUE 2023

The first article is about a 1,340 steam engine order built in America for the Societe National des Chemins de fer Francisise (SNCF) railroad in France in 1945. These engines were assembled in just 72.5 hours each. A lot quicker than the K-4 restoration but these manufacturers were geared up for this project.

Next is an article on "Benny" being found. In the Fall issue of 2022 the caboose from Benzel's Pretzels was moved to ARMM and the "man" in the window waving to visitors seemed to be lost. But now he had been found and is in desperate need of some TLC. Maybe a project the chapter could undertake?

Joe Harrella continues to keep us informed with local news and the chapter minutes. Due to a "bleep" in the last issue, three months were missed. A BIG STEAM ORDER FROM FRANCE by Leonard Alwine

For this Coal Bucket issue, I once again refer to an article in one of my old <u>Railroad Magazine</u> books I purchased recently. It is an article about a multi unit purchase of steam engines for the Societe Nationale des Chemins de fer Franeaise (SNCF) railroad in France. Before the war they had over 17,000 engines on the roster. But following the war fewer than 3,600 remained in operational status. They also had few men or builders able to produce for SNCF.

Robert Leguille, Chief Mechanical Engineer for SNCF looked to America to quickly build steam engines as replacements for those lost in the war.

The engines had to be built close to SNCF standards for power, weight and size. P.E. Perry of Lima Locomotive Works in Ohio and Ralph Johson and Charles Kraus of Baldwin Locomotive in Eddystone Pennsylvania collaborated and came up with a design for the model 141R engine produced for the SNCF. A total of 1340 engines were ordered.

The first one was ordered March 1945 and was dedicated July 30th and shipped to France in September and entered service two months later after testing on the SNCF. These engines could pull 600 ton passenger trains at 65 mph or 1500 ton freight trains at 30 mph.

The order for the 141R engines was split between several U.S. and Canadian builders.

Lima Built	1-130, 1021, 1120
American Built	181-440, 861-1020, 1121-1160
Baldwin Built	441-860, 1061-1200
Montreal Built	1201-1300
Canadian Loco	1300-1341

Once built they were shipped in special trains by rail to Wechawken, N.J. shipyard where they were lifted by crane aboard boats and shipped to France. Sadly, 17 of the Montreal built locomotives were lost at sea en route to France when that boat sank.

The amazing thing is that these locomotives could be final assembled in 72.5 hours from frame bed to live steam operation testing. Of course, many parts were built in other areas of the shops and funneled into the final assembly area.

Just another example of what could be described as America's "hard work" ethics. Something missing from today's labor force.

Giving Birth to a Locomotive in 721/2 Hours

World War I had ended and the victory cries had barely died down, while Lima and the other builders were still busy turning out the 1340 ordered 141R's for France. The efficiency in locomotive construction had advanced to the point of three days being all that was needed to turn a suggestive engine frame bed into a sizzling full-size Mikado, ready for the test track and the paint shop. Much could be said, too, for the ease of construction when you were dealing with an order in the hundreds. The tools and dies, once set, could turn out the required parts in volume very rapidly. The usual time wasted from actual production in retooling from one locomotive order to another was eliminated. Furthermore, the familiarity of the shop crews with the locomotives' design certainly led to increased speed in assembling and knowledge of what comes next.





In the Fall 2022 issue of the Coal Bucket there was an article about caboose #477802 being donated and moved to ARMM after many years displayed at Benzel's Pretzels along 6th Avenue in Altoona. Benzel's used the caboose as a symbol of advertising for the company and had "Benny" inside the car waving at visitors coming to the factory for tours and the outlet store.

While on a photo mission at ARMM recently to photograph the changes in the display units in the yard, I was very happy to find Benny still waving from inside caboose #477802!!! It seems that he made the trip with the caboose and has spent the past winter inside it at ARMM.

Part 1 - New History Book Published

This past April a new history book was published by the Blair County Historical Society about the "Forgotten Town" of Glen White. It was written by Kevin Stiver.

Kevin is an amazing young man who is very interested in local history. He began his research for this writing at the age of 14 after his grandfather, Ray Stiver, took him on a car ride passed the old coke ovens of Glen White, located about two miles above the Horseshoe Curve. Kevin spent about a year researching all he could find out about that area.

The result is a 70 page book with a very detailed listing of all the buildings, people and the coal company of that town, including the town's demise. It sells for \$20.00 and is worth the price in photos alone.



A LOOK BACK

50 YEARS AGO	August 11, 1973, a new 5 car Amtrack train purchased from France arrived
	in Altoona after stopping at the Horseshoe Curve for a photo shoot.

25 YEARS AGO Conrail officially ceased to exist at 12:01 am, as Norfolk Southern and CSX Railroads took over the system.
