CHAPTER MEMBER AUTHORS NEW PUBLICATION

The Blair County Historical Society recently (November 1, 2024) released a new pamphlet that was written by the Chapter Coal Bucket Editor, Leonard Alwine.

The title of the pamphlet is <u>The History of the Altoona Works of the Pennsylvania Railroad Fire Department 1859-1995</u>. It details the PRR and it's fire fighting protection they provided for Altoona almost from the beginning of the town.

The PRR allowed the first volunteer fire company (Goodwill) to use a building at 12th Street and 9th Avenue inside the shop complex. A few years later the PRR purchased a horse drawn steam fire engine and placed it in the same building as the Goodwill company moved out. This fire engine was manned by the PRR machine shop employees as was future purchases of fire apparatus purchased by the PRR.

The PRR eventually built a brick fire station across 12th Street from the original one and a short time later another brick station along Chestnut Avenue at 1st Street inside the car shop complex.

In 1895, the City of Altoona created a paid fire department and purchased all the volunteer stations and equipment (most of it provided by the City). The two PRR companies became #7 and #8 on the AFD rosters but were still manned by PRR employees and paid by the PRR Railroad Company. That lasted until 1985 when the last PRR (now Conrail) fire engine was retired.

This publication details the progress of this fire company from the hand drawn and horse drawn units of the 1850's through the first gasoline powered truck in the early 1900's to the end in 1985.

It was written by Leonard Alwine, using many photos, articles and books from conventions in the early days that he has collected over the years of Altoona and Blair County Fire Departments. He himself, has been a volunteer fireman with Logan Township since 1968.

The pamphlet condenses the PRR history into an eight page publication with 35 photos, about half that he has collected over the years and the rest are ones he has taken himself.

It is available at the gift shop at Baker's Mansion - Blair County Historical Society, 3419 Oak Lane, Altoona, PA 16602 - at the very reasonable price of \$5.00. It is a must for any PRR or fire fighting enthusiast.




Photo of the cover of the book showing the PRR engine from 1941 at the Horseshoe Curve (9-14-24)

FINALLY!!

On Saturday, November 9, 2024, the funicular at the Horseshoe Curve was "officially" placed back into service. It was welcomed by a large crowd of people waiting to ride to the top of the Curve once again. It is better for those who cannot walk up the 198 steps to get to the top and the lookout to see the trains.

The funicular had actually passed all the tests a week before and had a "soft" opening for a couple days before the official opening on November 9th.

It will be operating for the rest of the season, Friday - Sunday from 9:00 am til 4:00 pm until the Curve closes in December for the winter. That will be a good test run and hopefully barring any other problems, it will be ready in the Spring for the 2025 tourist season.

There are some limits for now though. It only runs every half hour and is only allowed to carry 12 passengers each time per car. A schedule is posted at the entrance gate.

It did feel good though, getting to ride to the top once again after a four year shutdown. A special t-shirt is available in the gift shop for \$21.99, produced to mark the occasion.

A MODEL OF ALTO TOWER

There has been discussion lately about the Alto Tower and the need to keep it fixed up and painted before it is too late. At the October chapter meeting it was stated by Dean McKnight that maybe a model of the tower could be built and displayed at the museum.

That got me thinking about a model of it that I built back in 2006-2007. That was in the days when my fingers still worked and I could see better and handle small parts.

The model I built was laser cut wood by Railway Heritage Models. My late wife, Diane, helped me to purchase it for our anniversary in June of 2006. We ordered it and it arrived July 10, 2006. It cost \$89.95 plus shipping. I am sure that I spent another \$25.00 on glue and paint. I built it and painted it to resemble the original colors as shown on the box. It is an H-O scale model.

Even back then I could only work on it for a short time until my fingers would cramp up and I had to stop for a day or two. I finally finished it January 25, 2007. It turned out pretty good but I am sure that I could not build it today due to arthritis. Following are some photos of the finished model which I took in November 2024.

UNDER THE WIRE

Back in the early 1930's, the North American Tractor Operators and Manufacturers banded together to produce a "modern" trolley car. The group became known as the Electric Railway Presidents Conference Committee. Some five years later, the effort produced the first new street car that debuted in New York City on October 1, 1936. It was named a PCC car after the committee's name.

Over the next few years, more than 5,000 of these new "cars" were made for United States and Canada traction companies.

The closest they ever came to Altoona was in Johnstown, which purchased 17 of these cars (#401-417) in 1947. When retired in 1960, the electrical gear and trucks were sold to Brussels, overseas.

But the PCC cars would soon cross over the Atlantic for European countries. In an article by Quintus Vosman in the December issue of Trains Magazine, he details the PCC cars and transit companies that used them including some photos which I have gleaned to write this article on these long running trolley cars.

The first one went to Belgium along with two kits of parts to build more cars in 1949. The regular PCC car was a little too big for the narrow streets so the two kits were built and assembled in Belgium by La Bugerise at Nicais & Delcuve who became the overseas builder of PCC cars for the Hague of the Netherlands and were made a little narrower and shorter. Brussels ordered cars from them in the early 1950's. Riders did not like the stained windows so many were built without them. The Hague eventually had 234 "American" looking PCCs on the roster. Other operators in Czechoslovakia and Eastern Block countries used over 14,000 of these cars, with many still in service today. That is three times as many built overseas as were built in the USA.

The Hague is celebrating 75 years of PCC use overseas in 2025. They will operate a 41.6 mile line along the Belgium coast followed by another celebration in Brussels using some of the 20 plus cars preserved in the Hague Transit Heritage fleet in 2026. That is quite an example of a 90 year old American trolley design still in use daily overseas.

One of Hague cars did return to American turf when retired and is on display at the National Capital Trolley Museum in Cloesville near Washington, D.C.. That is car #3129 (perhaps a future bus tour for Dick?).

A TRIBUTE TO THE "TRAIN LADY"

It seems only fitting that a special tribute be made in the Coal Bucket to Altoona's longest active train operator, affectionately nicknamed "The Train Lady".

Carol Lee Patterson (October 13, 1938 - January 8, 2025), was not a member of the Horseshoe Curve Chapter N.R.H.S, although her son did marry one of Les Shafer's daughters and remembers riding on Les's little steam engine. But Carol did operate Santa Express and Easter Bunny trains for 38 years at the Logan Valley Mall. That long term service earned her that special nickname from the many families who brought their kids to ride on those trains during the shopping seasons. Later in years those same kids returned with their kids to ride the train.

Carol loved children and truly enjoyed this seasonal job operating the train for it's owner, Frank Marucci of Marucci Brothers, Inc., from Wilnerding near Monroeville.

Carol was very saddened when the Mall burned down in December 1994 shortly before Christmas destroying her train. When the melted train was removed from the mall and piled outside, she heard that scavengers were trying to take it for scrap. She drove to the mall and sat near her train until Frank and his crew could arrive and load it into his van and take it back to his shop.

A new train was acquired and she continued to operate it during the special seasons at the mall, totaling 38 years of service. A record that may never be broken by anyone else operating trains in Altoona.

For Carol, her last train has left the station, but the memories of those 1,000's of children and adults who rode those trains will live on in their minds. Kids and adults who were made happy enjoying a simple train ride while shopping.

You may not be at the control any longer, but you will forever be "The Train Lady".

May you rest in peace, Carol.

She retired in 2019 after 51 years of service with the Gingrich Insurance Agency where she worked as an insurance manager.





October 1, 1936

The first production PCC car entered service on the Brooklyn & Queens transit Corp. and Mayor Fiorella LaGuardia took part in the ribbon cutting service. He refused a coin from the President of the railroad using his own 5 cent coin to drop into the fare box becoming the first paying customer to ride in the new PCC car.

50 years ago

PA Secretary of Transportation, Jacob Kassab, helped to cut the ribbon on the new 7.5 million dollar 10th Avenue Expressway, completed 500 days ahead of schedule.

Patricia Connell, Altoona Public Library Director, announced the opeing of a multimedia center in the former coffee shop of the Penn Alto Hotel with records, film strips, posters and audio/visual equipment available to loan out.
